

Apply to connect by Oct. 20!



As colder temperatures approach, all new construction work to connect homes to municipal infrastructure will be on hold as of Oct. 20.

Over the winter, you may still start your RWSS application and continue making arrangements to connect your home.

New contractor quotes should be submitted in the spring ahead of the 2024 construction season to ensure quotes are accurate and still valid.

Have approved permits in place?



Work with an **approved permit** already in place can be completed after Oct. 20 as long as your contractor follows all applicable cold weather procedures to meet design guidelines and specifications.

Why do we need a Solid Waste Management Plan?

In Wood Buffalo, we send approximately 85,000 metric tonnes of garbage to the landfills each year. Waste composition studies show that over 70% of that garbage can be recycled or composted. An established Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP) will guide how trash and recycling is managed for years to come and work to accomplish these goals.

Council's Excellence Awards include four categories:

CITIZEN OF THE YEAR

This award recognizes an individual or group of individuals who has made outstanding contributions to the community as a volunteer or professional that have improved the quality of life in the region or have brought positive recognition to the region. Contributions can be in areas such as: arts and culture, education, environment, heritage, health, social inclusion, or any other area that contributes to the advancement and well-being of a community.

EVERYDAY HERO

This award recognizes an individual or group of individuals that has displayed heroic qualities during extraordinary circumstances. The everyday hero is dedicated to improving the lives of those around them, demonstrates selflessness through random acts of kindness and is making a positive impact in the region.

INDIGENOUS ADVOCATE

This award recognizes an individual or group of individuals who has made significant contributions to Indigenous communities in the region.

YOUTH

This award recognizes a youth or group of youths whose exceptional achievements have improved the quality of life in the region or have brought positive recognition to the region. The focus shall be on relevant leadership or volunteer contributions, extracurricular and community involvement. Candidates must be between 15-34 years as of December 31, 2022.





Bear Bins survey reminder





Walking Safety Tips

Walk Facing Traffic: If there is no sidewalk and you must walk on the side of the road, choose the side where you are facing oncoming traffic. This gives you the best chance to see traffic approaching closest to you and take evasive action if necessary.

Cross Safely: Look both ways before crossing any street. Make eye contact with any drivers who may be turning. Give them a wave. Make sure they see you.

Walk Single File: Unless you are on a sidewalk separate from the road, you should walk single file. This is especially important on a road with lots of curves. While is can be enjoyable to walk down the road two or three abreast chatting merrily, drivers don't expect it.

Stay aware of bikes and runnerS: Share the road and path with bikes and runners. Bike riders should alert you when approaching from behind with a bike bell or a "passing on the left/right." Listen for them.

Be Visible: Wear bright colors when walking in daytime. When walking at night wear light-colored clothing and reflective clothing or reflective vest to be visible.

Hang Up and Eyes Up: Chatting or texting while walking is as dangerous as doing that while driving. You are distracted and not as aware of your environment. You are less likely to recognize traffic danger, passing joggers and bikers or tripping hazards. Potential criminals can also see you as a distracted easy target.

When walking your pet: keep your pet on the side away from traffic so that they don't accidently dart into the roadway.



School Bus Safety Tips

Motorists (ATVs too!) need to respect the flashing lights on a school bus, which create a safety zone for children around the vehicle and are often the children's only defense when they get on or off the bus. Motorists should remember the following when approaching a school bus:

- Watch out for alternation flashing amber lights, which means a school bus is slowing to stop where students will either be getting on or off the bus
- Slow down and stop when the school bus activated its alternating flashing red lights. This means you MUST STOP whether you are approaching an on coming bus or following one. (The only exception to this rule is when the bus is on a two-way highway)
- Proceed only when the red lights on the bus have stopped flashing
- Watch for school uses loading and unloading children, even if the lights aren't flashing
- Be on the lookout for children crossing the road.
